This annual event is designed to match job seekers with Ohio’s growing biomedical organizations, featuring top employers in the biotech, pharmaceutical, R&D, and medical device industries. The anticipated 150+ attendees include recent and soon-to-be graduates as well as experienced individuals looking for new career paths.
